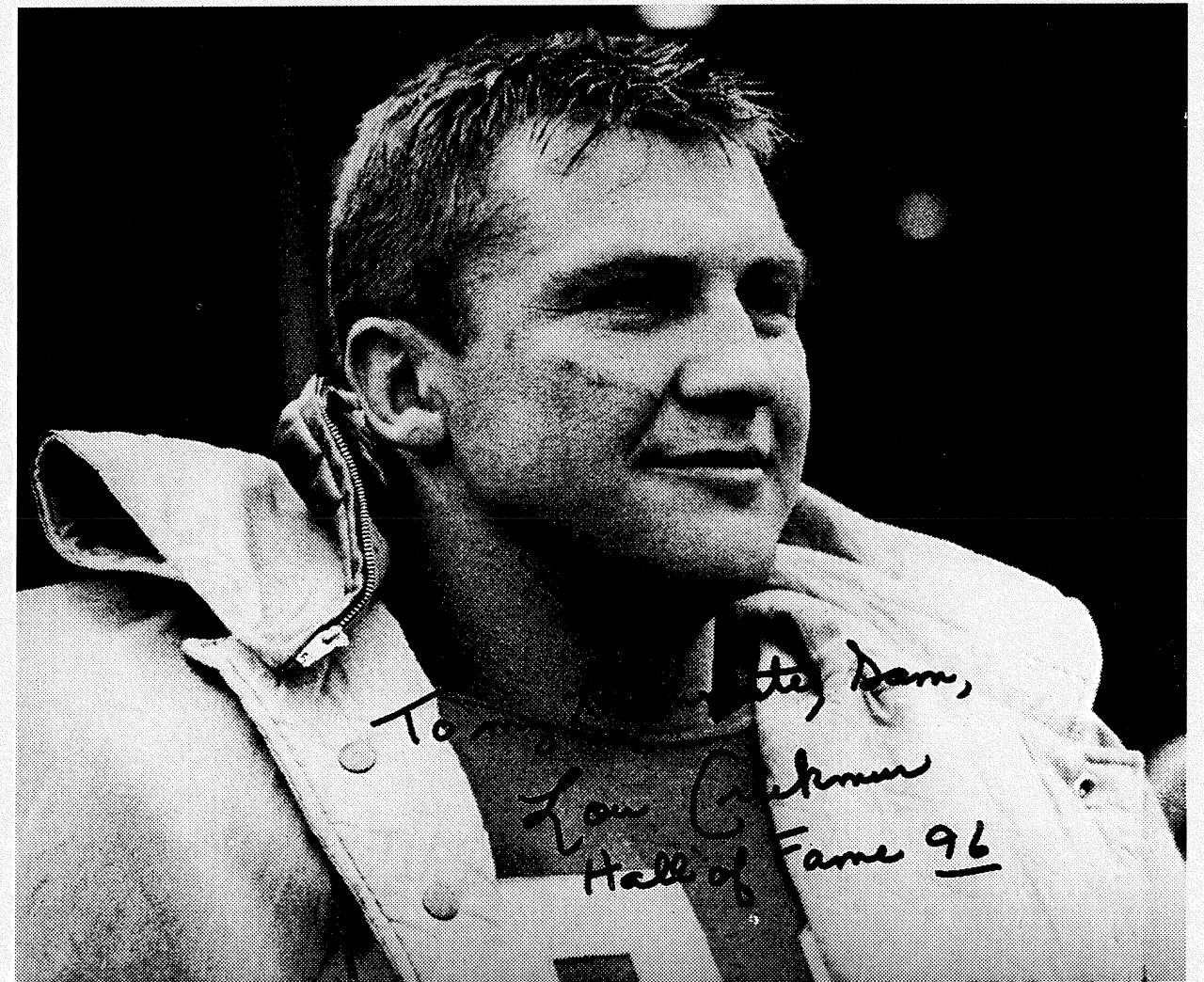

New kind of

homecoming

Halls of fame gaining popularity with area high schools

A graduate of Woodbridge High School Class of 1959, Brodtkin has received many honors during his lifetime, but he said the induction into the Woodbridge Hall of Fame was one of the most rewarding.

"It truly was a great honor being selected to the Woodbridge Township Athletic Hall of Fame," Brodtkin said. "Nostalgically looking back, I had the good fortune of playing and lettering three years of basketball, baseball and one year of football. Although I loved basketball, baseball provided me with the opportunity to attend Penn State on a baseball scholarship. I became the starting second baseman my sophomore year. During my senior year, we had the opportunity to represent the East at the 1963 NCAA College World Series in Omaha, Neb."

Brodtkin added: "I would like to believe that the values of leadership, teamwork and competitiveness I learned at Woodbridge High School have had a great deal to do with my business success."

There just could be a Hall of Fame coming to your neighborhood.

A growing phenomena in Central Jersey communities, local Halls of are, at long last, giving deserving individuals long overdue recognition for accomplishments while in high school.

There's the Perth Amboy Hall of Fame, which made its debut in 1984. And there's the Woodbridge Township Athletic Alumni Association Hall of Fame, which recently held its eighth annual induction ceremony banquet. St. Patrick's of Elizabeth is staging its fifth Hall of Fame program April 28. Last year, Bishop Ahr in Edison began the tradition.

New Brunswick is the latest to establish a Hall of Fame, and the first class will be inducted April 27.

Other communities are talking about establishing their own Hall of Fame.

While Woodbridge and New Brunswick put the focus on athletics, the other halls of fame feature individuals who have excelled in scholastics or made significant contributions during their high school careers.

Interestingly, the Hall of Fame banquets have become homecomings of sorts. They are genuine reunions, as honorees come from near and far, bringing with them some outstanding success stories.

Take the Woodbridge Township Hall of Fame, which honored 16 former athletes or those affiliated with athletics at Woodbridge, John F. Kennedy (Iselin) and Colonia high schools. Last year, the Woodbridge Township Hall of Fame inducted 32, with a reattendance of 175.

Bert Brodtkin, one of the giants of the beverage industry in the United States, returned from California for

around the nation. There are six cards of him, which he autographs, including his newest card as a new member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

He also does motivational tapes for Ryder and recently completed a Prudential Senior Care commercial. He's also been involved in commercials for Nike and Cadillac.

Creekmur also devotes time to charities, including the American Cancer Society and March of Dimes.

President of the South Florida Chapter of the National Football League Alumni Association, Creekmur is thrilled about being inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

"It's been like floating on a cloud," he said. "The elation couldn't be put into words. There are 185 players in the Hall of Fame and out of that about 140 or 145 are alive. Think of thousands and thousands who have played football over the year . . . you are in a select group."

Creekmur, who said he has been interviewed on several radio stations the last week, arrived in Canton yesterday. The itinerary included a "Hall of Fame Big Ribs Burnoff," a band concert and fireworks.

The Hall of Fame fever is scheduled for today with a Mayor's Breakfast at which Creekmur and the other inductees were to receive jackets. On tap this afternoon is a fashion show and later the Canton civic dinner.

The agenda for tomorrow starts with a Hall of Fame Festival Parade at 7:30 a.m., induction ceremonies at 11 a.m. and then the Hall of Fame football game between the Indianapolis Colts and New Orleans Saints.

As Creekmur said, "It's the biggest, wildest 'Wow' of my life" . . . and his friends and old neighbors in Woodbridge couldn't be happier for a more deserving "local boy" who made good.

going to City College of New York," Creekmur said.

But all that changed after leading the Woodbridge football team in 1943. The then-rangy 6-3, 190-pound tackle served as captain and leader and drew the attention of scouts from the College of William and Mary in Virginia.

However, there was a commitment to the U.S. Army.

Creekmur spent the next year in the Army and it was a year in which he would grow to 6-4 and bulk up to 240 pounds.

The College of William and Mary waited for Creekmur. He played football and studied education with the goal of becoming a physical education teacher.

Creekmur received his bachelor's degree from William and Mary and was named to the Look magazine All-America Team. Later, he returned to William and Mary and earned a master's degree in education.

In his nine-year pro football career with Detroit, Creekmur became one of the all-time greats. He played in eight NFL Pro Bowls and was named an All-NFL All-Star six times. He also served as captain of the Lions.

Creekmur played football Sundays and worked for a trucking company the rest of the week when there was no practice.

"I got \$1,000 per game and would have had to take a cut in pay to join the coaching staff after my playing days," Creekmur said.

Creekmur parlayed three NFL championships (the Lions lost out in two other title games) into a position with Ryder Truck Rentals after his playing days. He stopped working for Ryder a few years ago but remains a consultant on a nationwide basis.

Creekmur also has become a popular figure at collectible card shows

things we needed in the house," Creekmur said.

Creekmur also used his earnings to buy a bicycle. He would peddle to Fords, where he had a part-time job at age 16 at a Fords liquor store near the then-Fords movie house.

"I would stock shelves and wipe the dust from bottles two or three times a week," he said.

Creekmur attended Keasbey Elementary School.

He used to ride his bike to school from Fords. There was no other form of transportation to football practice and games when school was not in session. It was either riding a bike or walking, and he did both many times.

"I must have gone through 10 bikes," said Creekmur, who graduated from Woodbridge High School in 1944.

Rags to riches?

When it came to sports, that pretty much tells the story of Lou Creekmur.

"We never had a new or good football to play. We would find a piece of leather or strong cloth and stuff it with rags. That was our football," Creekmur said.

Creekmur spent whatever free time he had playing football with Paul Toth, one of his closest friends.

"We played on a cow pasture in Fords, but we didn't want to fall down for fear of landing in the wrong stuff," he said with a laugh.

While at Woodbridge High School, Creekmur thought about becoming a certified public accountant.

"I took the commercial business courses, and Robert Trautwein, a business teacher, thought I might be successful as a CPA because I was good in math. I had a knack for numbers, and we talked about possibly

Creekmur, who was a 6-4, 260-pound lineman in the pros, spent his youth in the Keasbey section, near Crows Mill Road in Fords. Then the family moved to the Hopelawn section and later to the Fords section.

"Things were very tough, financially, for my family growing up," said Creekmur. "My father left the family when I was very young, and my mother had to raise three sons and a daughter. She drove a truck, delivering kerosene and we all had jobs.

"I delivered newspapers and was lucky to make \$10 a week," he recalled. "The big day was Sunday, selling the New York and Newark papers and making \$3-\$5 on that day alone during the war years of 1941, '42, '43. That was a lot of money."

At age 70, Creekmur speaks proudly of being able to help his mother and family members to survive tough times.

"I would give my mother the money from delivering the papers and she was able to buy a bedroom set, a linoleum for the floors and other

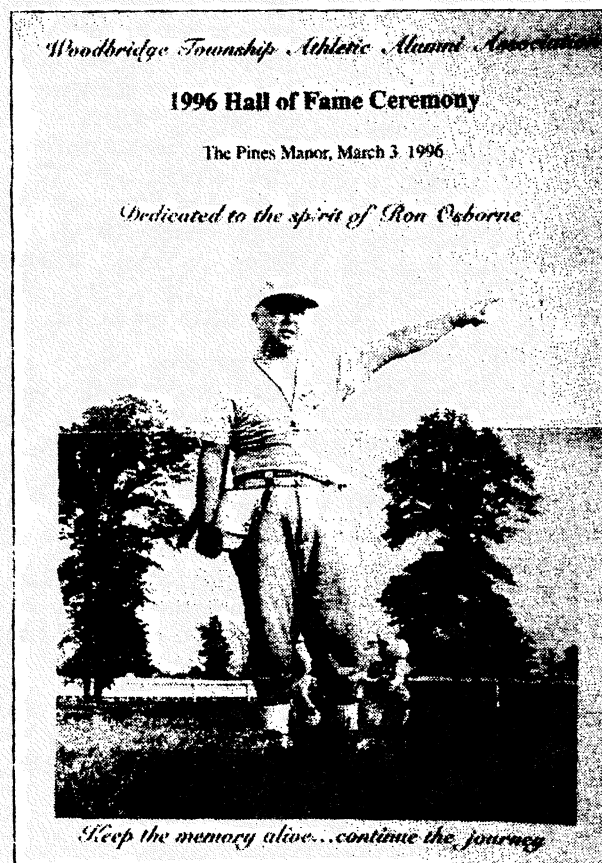

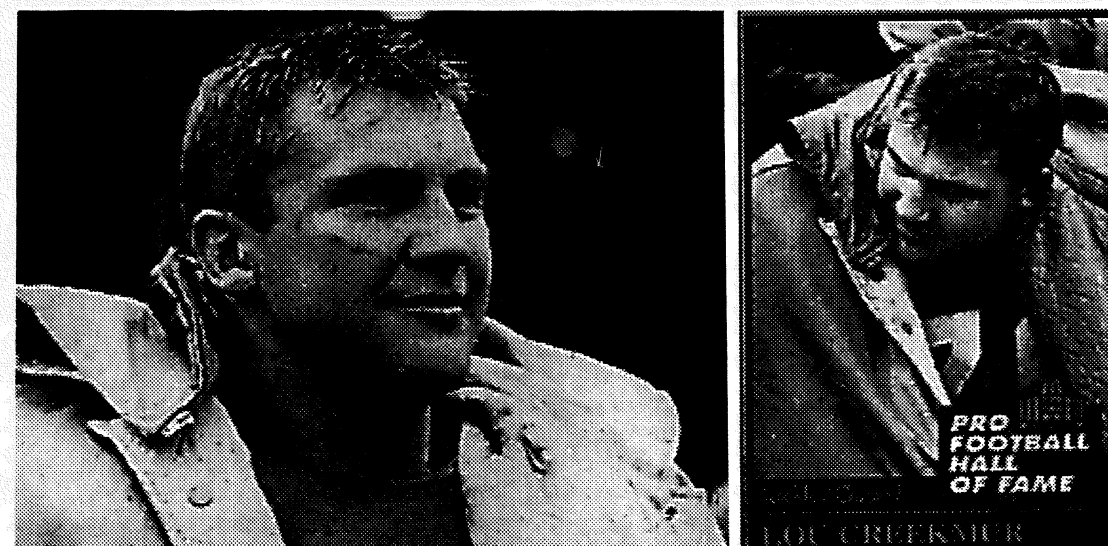


He's everybody's all-American

Woodbridge grad to enter hall of fame

It's the biggest, wildest 'Wow' of my life!" That's how Lou Creekmur, captain of the 1943 Woodbridge High School team, describes his induction tomorrow into the Professional Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Creekmur has vivid memories of his neighbors and the neighborhoods in Woodbridge, so important in the formative stages of his life.

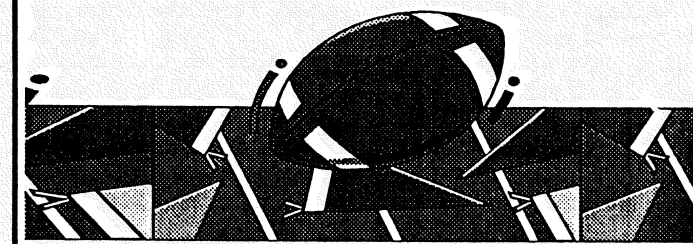

Lou Creekmur grew up in Keasbey, NJ, the son of James and Rose (Kaminski) Creekmur. His father, a delivery service owner, moved the family to Woodbridge where he played tackle in high school. He won a letter at tackle as a freshman for the College of William and Mary in 1944 and then joined the U.S. Army for two years. After returning to William and Mary in 1947, he started for the conference championship team. William and Mary finished 9-1 before losing 21-19 to Arkansas in the Dixie Bowl. As a junior, Lou played in the Dixie Bowl and scored the only touchdown of his career, running 70 yards after an intercepted pass. The recipient of the Jacobs Blocking Trophy in 1949, he played in the Senior Bowl and College All-Star Game. A track letter winner, he set a school record in the shot put and threw the discus.

When Lou's original class graduated in 1948, the Philadelphia Eagles (NFL) and Los Angeles Dons (AAFC) drafted him. He decided, however, to stay at William and Mary. After completing his eligibility, he was placed in the frozen player pool because the AAFC had disbanded. The Detroit Lions selected him from the pool. He became their regular offensive guard as a rookie in 1950. Following that season, Lou made the Pro Bowl squad, the first of eight consecutive seasons. He was named All-NFL from 1951 through 1954 as an offensive guard and tackle. He also played defense in key situations and spent part of the 1955 season at middle guard.

During his pro career, Lou played on three NFL championship teams and made All-NFL offensive tackle in 1956-57. He temporarily retired in 1959, but rejoined the Lions when they experienced injury problems...finally retiring permanently after playing the last eight games.

He has been named to the *Football Digest* All-Time All-Pro football team, has been selected for Hall of Fame induction for the Detroit Lions, the College of William and Mary and at Woodbridge High School.

He has had a long career with Ryder Truck and is currently director of customer and community relations. Lou has also served as a color commentator for the Miami Dolphins radio network in 1972.

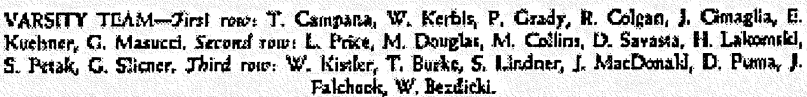
Walter played 3 years of football at Woodbridge, and after graduation was an outstanding lineman for the Woodbridge Golden Bears.

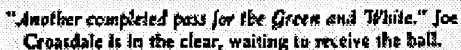

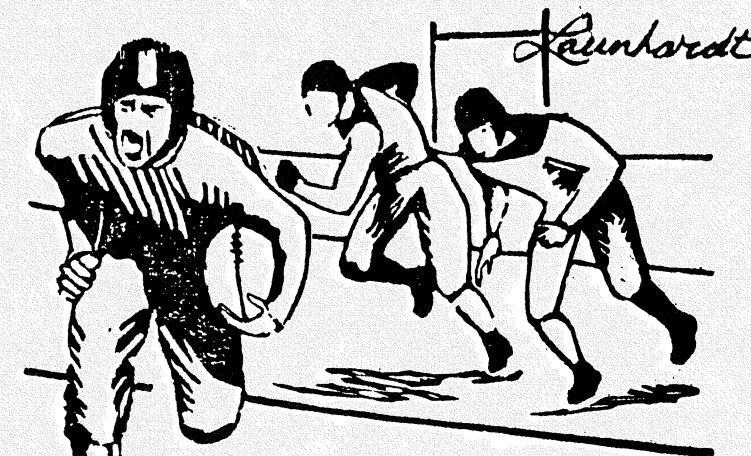

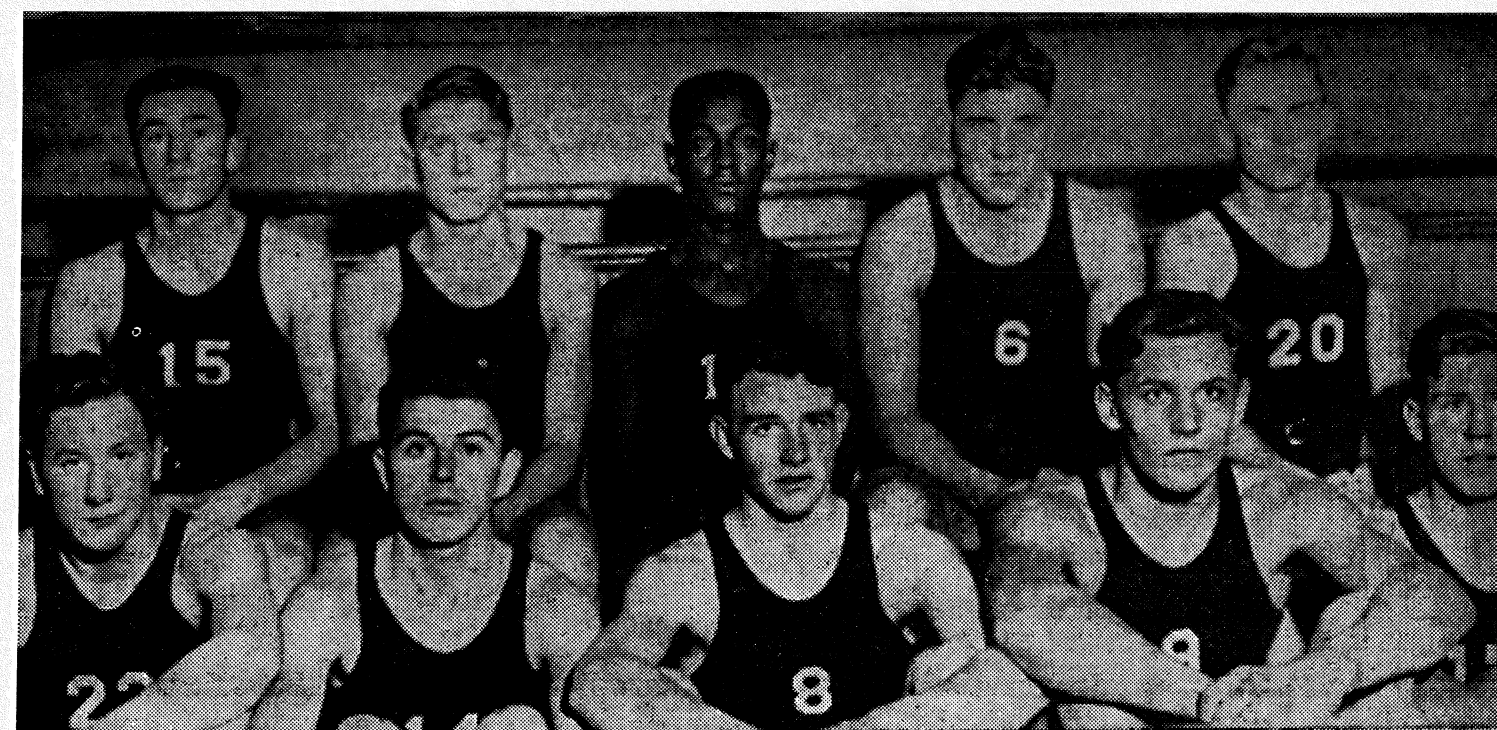

VICTORIOUS, emotional, exciting, fantastic—all are words which have been used to describe the 1967 football season. Yet no words could ever really capture the spirit of this season. Doing the impossible became commonplace for our Mustangs as they rolled on to an undefeated season, the first in Woodbridge Township in 37 years. Highlights in the string of 9 victories were an 18-14 win over East Brunswick, a 41-0 smash over Colonia and a rewarding 14-0 victory over J. P. Stevens.

Ball control and strong defense, attained through hard work by the boys and excellent instruction by the coaches, were the keys to Kennedy's success. J.P. Stevens upholds its reputation under Pisano

There were a few question marks hovering over the J.P. Stevens High School girls tennis team when practice commenced in early September.

After the graduation of their top two players from last fall's 13-4 squad and the retirement of veteran skipper Dea Miller, the Hawks' proud tennis tradition seemed to be at a crossroads.

Under new coach Ellen Pisano, the haze cleared up rather quickly.

The Hawks opened their season with a commanding 5-0 win over highly-touted Old Bridge and embarked on an 11-3 campaign that included a strong second-place showing at the Greater Middlesex Conference Tournament.

For blending a lineup of new faces and much-improved veterans into a winning unit in her first season, Pisano is The Home News & Tribune Girls Tennis Coach of the Year.

"I came into a program that already had the reputation," said Pisano, who coached tennis at Woodbridge High School from 1979-85 before leaving to be home with her three children. "To maintain that reputation is really a challenge."

What sweetened her return to coaching, Pisano said, was the chemistry and camaraderie between the players.

"They're a tight-knit group. That really makes a difference," she said. "They were very coachable."

And Pisano did coach. To fill the holes in the singles positions, she helped develop two of the GMC's most-improved players — sophomore Julia Pe at first and

gles and senior Carolyn Figurski at third singles.

Fu, who didn't play last fall, finished 13-5 at the top spot, including a semi-final showing at the GMC. Figurski, who had played doubles for three years, finished 15-3 and won the GMC third singles title.

Combined with seasoned second singles player Ellyn Poltrick and a pair of quality doubles tandems, the Hawks were playing super-competitive tennis — Pisano-style.

"I'm a teaching coach," she said. "I used humor a lot and tried not to make things a pressure situation."

After a brief period of adjustment, the players began to rally around their new mentor and the wins continued to tally.

And win J.P. Stevens did, except against arch-rival East Brunswick, which dealt the Hawks all three of their losses and topped them in the GMC.

Dethroning the Bears will be Pisano's mission for next fall, but she's already begun thinking about it.

"We could possibly be a little more of a challenge to them," she said, noting that six of her seven starters will return. "A lot of times it's whether you believe in yourself."

After one season under Pisano, the J.P. Stevens tennis faithful are believing.

"We used to sit on the back porch and dream of making it to the big leagues someday. He was no more of an athlete than I was (in the minors). He wasn't famous. He wasn't a sure-shot major leaguer. He was just another guy," Miller recalls. "We made \$51.26 after taxes a week, and all of the sudden he was a great blitzer. (He) broke the Florida State League record for triples."

Miller says Rose was "cocksure" and loved to gamble, even in the minors. But his most vivid memory of

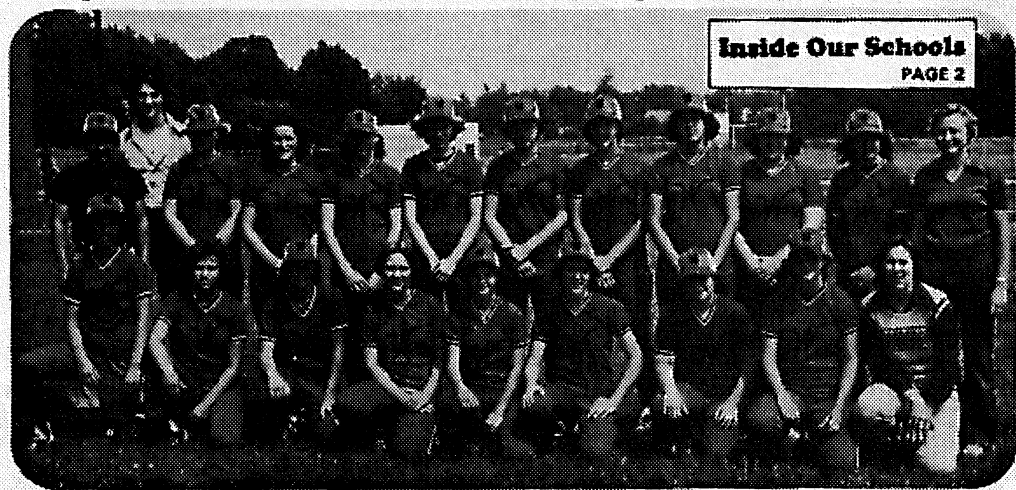
Koperwhals was named to the first team all-state squad at shortstop. As a result of her efforts in molding the

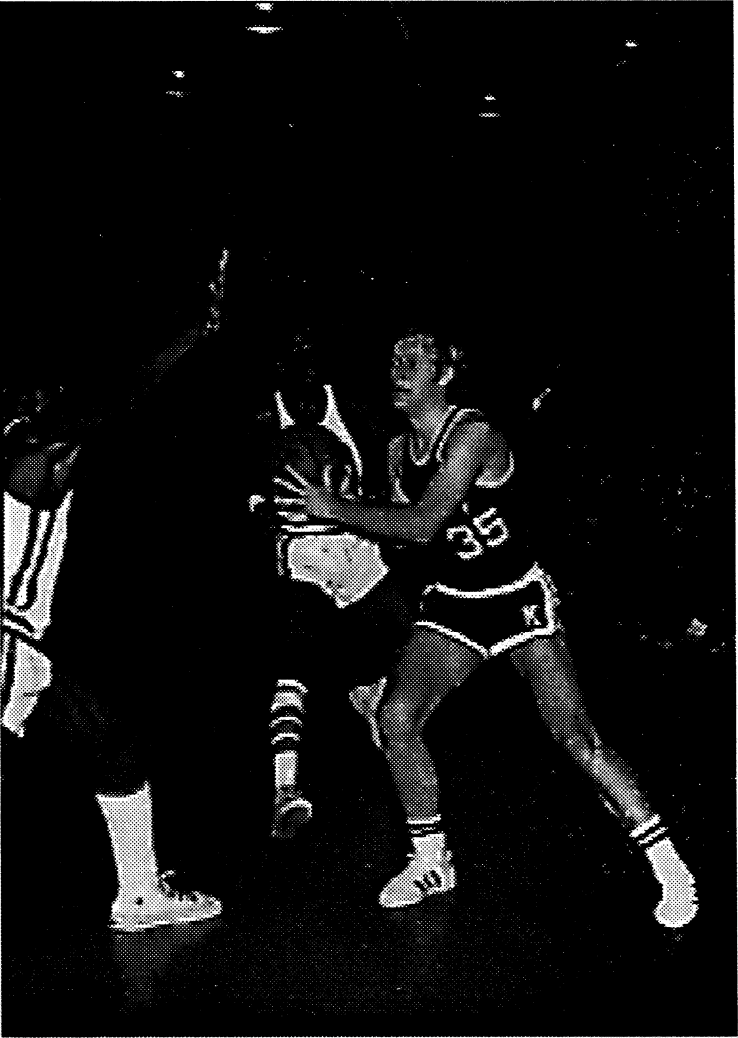

Wataha guided Woodbridge High to two championships

WOODBRIDGE — It's harder to win the second time around.

You will hear coaches, players and fans echo that phrase and it has become a cliché in the world of sports.

In this past year, we've seen the Dallas Cowboys delivered an NFL championship. We've seen the Washington Bullets yield their NBA title and most recently and more locally, we've seen the Woodbridge High School girls softball team relinquish its State Group IV crown.

But Woodbridge High softball coach Joan Wataha escaped the dethroning of champions and for her coaching genius this season she has been chosen The Home News Middlesex County Coach of the Year for the second straight year.

During the past two softball campaigns, Wataha has guided the Barrons

to two Central Jersey Group IV championships, a state Group IV title, a Middlesex County Athletic Conference championship and a sparkling 44-4 record.

In those two impressive seasons, Woodbridge posted identical 24-4 records. In 1978, she coached the Barrons to the NJSIAA State Group IV title with a 9-1 victory over Westfield. This season the Barrons made another appearance in the final but came out on the short end of a 4-3 decision at the hands of Ridgewood.

When your the defending champion, everyone is gunning for you. Was pressure the major factor which prevented the Barrons from winning two consecutive state titles?

"Yes, I think there was a little more pressure on the kids this year," conceded Wataha who resides in Melicham. "The kids knew it would be hard to win it two years in a row and they

definitely had a lot on their minds going into the game."

The season for Wataha and her group was still enjoyable as it captured the Central Jersey Group IV crown with a victory against Hamilton East and also it won the tough Middlesex County Athletic Conference, a feat which last year's squad fell short of.

"We lost one (the state final), but gained another (the conference)," noted Wataha.

Overall the Barrons' season was quite a success and Wataha will be the first to admit it.

"It was a little bit of a let down being in the final of the state tournament, but the season was very successful and enjoyable," Wataha continues. "The season got very hectic towards the end. With the rain, we were playing five games in a row and we were all kind of relieved when the season ended."

When talking about the success of the Barrons the past few years, Wataha an East Stroudsburg State College gradu-

ate says, "But Wataha did not see the incentive weather as an excuse for the team's effort in the state final. "The weather had no effect because every team was in the same situation."

Of the 28 games in which the Barrons played, the only which clearly stood out in Wataha's mind was the 9-0 victory over Sayreville in the semifinals of the Middlesex County Coaches Association Tournament under the lights at Memorial Stadium, in New Brunswick.

"The Sayreville game was the most memorable game of the season," explains Wataha who finished her fifth year as the Barrons' manager. "Sayreville knocked us out of the conference last year and it's always a good feeling to beat Sayreville."

"We're losing some fine players this year but I'm still optimistic. We have some good sophomores who I'll be counting on a lot," noted Wataha.

Donna Koperwhata is one of those fine players Wataha referred to. Koperwhata who was sporting a fifty .450 batting average going into the final game has been the Barrons' shortstop the past few years and replacing her will be Wataha's toughest task.

"I'll never be able to field a shortstop like Donna again. She's such an all-around athlete," praised Wataha of her star infielder who will be enrolling at Trenton State College in the fall.

Another "fine" player Wataha will miss a great deal is Joann Matuse, the

catcher who was carrying a .457 average into her final scholastic game.

"Joann also is going to be very hard to replace. Shortstop and catcher are the two hardest positions and they will be missed," added Wataha.

The other senior starter who will be among the missing next campaign is third baseman Lauri Martelli, a .358 hitter.

Junior Maura DiLeo will be counted on heavily next year to guide the Barrons club. DiLeo was the team's top batter with a .323 tag but her athletic ability might earn her a spot in the infield where bodies will be needed as the Barrons start their quest for the Group IV crown.

"Maura is a good all-around athlete. We might have to put her in the infield and we'll depend on some sophomores to pull us through," said Wataha.

Wataha has been teaching at Woodbridge for six years. Her husband, John, is the director of adult education for the Middlesex County Vocational schools.

The Watahas have two children, Pam (19), who was a former Metuchen High School scholar-athlete, and John (18), a former Metuchen High football player who graduated on Thursday.
